FIRST READING EXODUS 24:3-8

When someone makes a business arrangement, they usually sign a contract. Although it might be seen as just a piece of paper, the contract is legally binding. If anyone fails to keep their side of the agreement, they can be taken to court. When

Moses makes the covenant with God they don't sign a piece of paper. Something much more significant and memorable happens. Bulls are sacrificed and their blood seals the covenant. Everyone knows they are part of something very special.

We say these words or sing a hymn as the priest approaches the altar.

We ask for God's help. Listen now to the priest as he offers this prayer.



DO YOU KNOW?

Friday 11 June is the feast of The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. You might have seen a picture or statue of the Sacred Heart, where Jesus is pointing to his heart, shown outside his body. Jesus' heart represents his love for every one of us. Let's thank Jesus for loving us so much.

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN.

Moses seals the covenant between God the people with the blood of the sacrifice.

The cantor or psalmist sings or says the psalm. Listen to the verses, and then respond by using these words.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM PSALM 115

The cup of salvation I will raise;
I will call on the Lord's name.

Or Alleluia!



SECOND READING HEBREWS 9:11-15

This letter reminds the people about the sacrifices which used to be made in the Temple and emphasises the fact that they are not needed any more. When Jesus died on the cross, his blood sealed the new covenant. No more

sacrifices are needed. Nothing can ever top Jesus! Jesus' death and resurrection has healed our relationship with God once and for all. Jesus makes it possible for us all to have a loving, covenant relationship with God the Father.

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN.

Jesus' sacrifice on the cross seals the new covenant.



We give a shout of praise to God, using these words taken from the Bible.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia!
I am the living bread which has come down from heaven,
says the Lord.
Anyone who eats this bread will live for ever.
Alleluia!



THINK

We don't like to remember that in Moses' time animals were sacrificed. Times have changed. Today we want to please God by looking after creation. How can you care for animals? Perhaps you can look after a pet or find out how to help insects.



GOSPEL MARK 14:12-16. 22-26

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St Mark.

Jesus' friends help to get everything ready to celebrate Passover. This important festival reminds the people how, when they were slaves in Egypt, the angel of death passed over the Hebrew homes. The sign of the blood of the lamb on the doorposts meant that they were all

saved and were then free to escape. This Passover meal is different. Jesus takes the bread and says it is his body. He takes the wine and says it is his blood. Jesus is showing what the loving relationship of our covenant with God really means. Jesus is the lamb who brings us all freedom.

STAND to LISTEN

to the priest or deacon as he prepares to read the Gospel.

Before he reads the Gospel, what does the priest do to his forehead, his lips and his heart? Can you copy him?



PRAY

"I am the living bread."

Perhaps you can bake bread with someone at home. As you work, think about all the people you love and the life God has given you. Make your baking into a prayer.

Listen to the reader as he or she encourages us to pray for situations and people in need. This is a prayer you could say privately.

Watch as the gifts are made ready and the priest washes his hands and prepares for the Eucharistic Prayer.



DO

Find out about the symbolism of the different foods that Jewish people eat as part of the seder meal during Passover.

We listen to the prayer of praise and thanks to God.

You are invited to sing a Communion song or say this verse, which has been especially chosen for today's celebration.



PRAYER OF THE FAITHFUL

FIRST READING EZEKIEL 17:22-24

Ezekiel paints a vivid picture of a strong, beautiful tree. The prophet describes how God will take a healthy shoot and plant it in a safe place. It is going to grow branches and bear fruit, giving shade

and protection for birds. Everyone will know that God gives life to the earth and everything in it. Furthermore, this tree is an image of the line of kings God will provide to take care of the people of Israel.

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. Ezekiel uses words to paint a picture of God's love and care.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM PSALM 91

It is good to give you thanks, O Lord.

The cantor or psalmist sings or says the psalm. Listen to the verses, and then respond by using these words.



SECOND READING 2 CORINTHIANS 5:6-10

Paul is confident that he will share in Jesus' resurrection and enjoy life after death. Here he is reminding the people of Corinth that living as God asks is all we can do. If we try to do

what God has asked we can be confident of enjoying life with God too. Whatever we do, we do because we want to please God. Everyone will be rewarded, just as we deserve to be.

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. We want to please God, whatever we are doing.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia!

The seed is the word of God, Christ the sower;
whoever finds the seed will remain for ever.
Alleluia!

DO YOU KNOW?

The Church is now in **Ordinary Time**; time to reflect on the wonderful ways **Jesus spread God's love** during his life on earth and how **Jesus is always present** in our lives. The liturgical colour used in this special time is **green, the colour of life and growth**.



THINK

God's kingdom is here with us now - as well being something we will all enjoy fully in the future! **Spreading love, justice and peace** will build God's kingdom. **Tiny acts of kindness make a big difference**. How will we show that Jesus is our king today?



GOSPEL MARK 4:26-34

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St Mark.

Just like Ezekiel in our first reading, Jesus uses the imagery of a tree growing to explain a difficult idea. God's kingdom is growing, even if we are not aware of it. The kingdom of God is like a tiny mustard seed. It starts off really small, but grows into "the biggest

shrub of all". The tree's branches give shelter and protection to the all the birds of the air. The kingdom of God may start off as a tiny seed, but it will steadily grow strong. God's kingdom will grow from all the tiny, good and kind things we do.

STAND to LISTEN

to the priest or deacon as he prepares to read the Gospel.

Before he reads the Gospel, what does the priest do to his forehead, his lips and his heart? Can you copy him?

Listen to the reader as he or she encourages us to pray for situations and people in need. This is a prayer you could say privately.

and Job is very angry
with God. Yet, it is in his
suffering that Job meets
God and knows for the
first time that God really
is with him.

LOOK at the reader
and LISTEN.
Job meets God in
his suffering.

O give thanks to the Lord,
for his love endures for ever.

Or Alleluia!

Listen to the verses,
and then respond by
using these words.



SECOND READING 2 CORINTHIANS 5:14-17

Jesus loves us all very
much. By giving his life
for us, Jesus has shown
us just how much we
matter. Now we have
new life and hope. We
know that good can
come out of anything
bad. Jesus died and

rose again. The disciples
know that Jesus'
resurrection changed
him and that we are also
changed because of it.
We have seen what real
love is and now we want
to live in the same way,
putting other people first.

LOOK at the reader
and LISTEN.
Jesus' love makes
us all new!

GOSPEL MARK 4:35-41

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St Mark.

Imagine getting into the boat with Jesus and the disciples to go to the other side of the Lake. Suddenly you are in the middle of a storm. The wind is howling and the waves breaking into the boat so that you are afraid it will sink. Where is Jesus when you need

him? Then you see him – asleep, with his head on a cushion! Jesus tells the wind and waves to be quiet. The storm drops and all is calm. You are amazed at Jesus' power! Jesus asks, "Why are you so frightened? How is it that you have no faith?"

◀ **STAND to LISTEN** to the priest or deacon as he prepares to read the Gospel. Before he reads the Gospel, what does the priest do to his forehead, his lips and his heart? Can you copy him?



PRAY

"Quiet now! Be calm!"
Use your imagination to pray. Put yourself into the Gospel story. Trust Jesus to calm the storms in your life. Know that he is always with you.



FIRST READING WISDOM 1:13-15; 2:23-24

God does not want us to suffer. God is good and everything God makes is good. Although bad things, like death, are part of life, God does not enjoy seeing people in any kind of pain. God made us for

life. God wants us all to be healthy and to be able to live life to the full. We are made in God's image, to share in God's love. We will be able to enjoy life now and forever by following God's ways.

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. Our good God made us for life.

The cantor or psalmist sings or says the psalm. Listen to the verses, and then respond by using these words.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM PSALM 29

I will praise you, Lord, you have rescued me.



SECOND READING 2 CORINTHIANS 8:7. 9. 13-15

Following Jesus means giving to other people. Just like Jesus we want to share our faith, our enthusiasm and our love. We also need to share our money too. If someone is in need, we have a duty to help.

However, we need to strike a balance. We are not asked to give so much that we have nothing left for ourselves. As Christians, our aim is to make sure that no one has too much while other people go hungry.

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. Be generous to others, but balance your own needs too.

DO YOU KNOW?

On Tuesday 29 June we celebrate the feast of **Ss Peter and Paul, Apostles**. These apostles were very different men with very different ideas about what it meant to be a Christian. GOSPEL MARK 5:21-43

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St Mark.

When Jairus' daughter becomes ill, he turns to Jesus in his desperation. News about Jesus has spread and crowds of people have come and are pressing all around him. One sick woman knows that even if she touches Jesus' cloak she will be healed. While Jesus is speaking to her,

messengers come to tell Jairus not to bother Jesus any more. Jairus' daughter has already died. When he hears this news, Jesus reassures everyone saying "Do not be afraid; only have faith." Arriving at the house Jesus takes the little girl's hand and tells her to get up. And Jairus' daughter gets up, healed!

Listen to the reader as he or she encourages us to pray for situations and people in need. This is a prayer you could say privately.
