FIRST READING ACTS 9:26-31

Saul was a real enemy of the first Christians, tracking them down, putting them in jail and even killing them. It's not surprising then that the disciples are afraid of Saul when he arrives in Jerusalem to join them. They just didn't trust he

really had changed and become a Christian. Barnabas tells them the story of Saul's conversion and how he has been bravely preaching about Jesus in Damascus. Now Saul shows by his actions that he really is a believer.



LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. Saul really has changed and become a Christian.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM PSALM 21

You, Lord, are my praise in the great assembly.
Or Alleluia!



The cantor or psalmist sings or says the psalm. Listen to the verses, and then respond by using these words.



SECOND READING 1 JOHN 3:18-24

If we love God then we will love each other. This sounds very nice, but is not always easy. Love means putting someone else before ourselves and doing something to help and care for them. We can't just talk about love;

we have to put our words into action. We don't need to worry though, because Jesus will help us to live as he asks. Everyone will know that we love God when they see us caring for each other.



LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. Love is about what we do, not just what we say or feel.

DO YOU KNOW?

Monday 3 May is the feast of Ss Philip and James, Apostles. Both men were friends of Jesus, each chosen to be one of his twelve apostles. On Tuesday 4 May we celebrate the feast of The English Martyrs, forty men and women who gave their lives for their faith. We ask Jesus to help us to be a good friend to him, like all these saints.



THINK

Vines grow grapes and they were very important in Jesus' time. It takes a long time and hard work to grow good fruit. Our good deeds are like fruit. If we stay with Jesus we will have lots of help as we grow.



GOSPEL JOHN 15:1-8

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St John.

Jesus is the true vine and God the Father is like the farmer looking after the vine. Jesus says we are like the branches of the vine. To produce fruit a branch must stay part of the vine plant. If we want to produce good fruit, then we must stay with

Jesus. We need Jesus and each other to help us to do good things in the world. Together we will be able to do great things! If we are rooted in God's love we will grow strong. We will be able to follow Jesus, spreading love to the people we meet.



FIRST READING ACTS 10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48

Sometimes people think that they are the only ones who have a special relationship with God. Today we hear how Peter realised that God is happy with anyone who tries to do what is right. The Holy Spirit has been given to everyone. God

has no favourites. God loves everyone. This was a very important moment in the early Church. From now on they welcomed people from every race and nationality into their community. They understood that everyone is equal in God's eyes.

We say these words or sing a hymn as the priest approaches the altar.

We ask for God's help. Listen now to the priest as he offers this prayer.

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. God does not have favourites!

The cantor or psalmist sings or says the psalm. Listen to the verses, and then respond by using these words.

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. If we know love, we know God because God is love.



We give a shout of praise to God, using these words taken from the Bible.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM PSALM 97

The Lord has shown his salvation to the nations.

SECOND READING 1 JOHN 4:7-10

This letter tells us what our faith is about: love. Let's love each other, because love comes from God. Anyone who loves knows God, because God is love. The more we learn to live, the more we will get to

know God. We can see how much God loves us because we have seen Jesus. Jesus showed us by everything he did just how much God loves us and if we live like Jesus did we will become even more loving too.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia!
Jesus said: "If anyone loves me he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we shall come to him."
Alleluia!



DO YOU KNOW?

Thursday 13 May is The Ascension of the Lord. If we "ascend", we go up. On this feast day we remember that Jesus went up to heaven. It celebrates the fact that Jesus is king and reminds us that we will be able to go to heaven one day. When God the Son, Jesus, ascended to heaven, God the Holy Spirit came, so that we will never be alone.



THINK

Jesus loves each one of us just as much as God the Father loves him. Each one of us has been chosen by God and is very special. Knowing we are loved so much makes us very happy!



GOSPEL JOHN 15:9-17

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St John.

Jesus wants us all to be happy and he knows that we will be happy if we stay with him. The best way to happiness is to live as Jesus asks. Jesus asks us to love each other and by giving up his life he has shown us what that means. When

we put other people first we are showing what real love is too. Jesus doesn't want us to do what he says because we have to, like servants. We are Jesus' friends and he wants us to live as he asks because he wants what is best for us.

new apostle will be an eye witness and be able to talk from first hand experience. After two candidates are nominated, the apostles pray for guidance. Matthias is chosen by lot and is now listed as one of the twelve apostles.

We say these words or sing a hymn as the priest approaches the altar.

We ask for God's help. Listen now to the priest as he offers this prayer.

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. The apostles choose Judas' replacement.

The cantor or psalmist sings or says the psalm. Listen to the verses, and then respond by using these words.

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. If we live in love we live in God, and God lives in us.

We give a shout of praise to God, using these words taken from the Bible.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM PSALM 102

The Lord has set his sway in heaven.
Or Alleluia!



SECOND READING 1 JOHN 4:11-16


The Spirit of the Lord has filled the whole world and that which contains all things understands what is said, alleluia.

FIRST READING ACTS 2:1-11

Imagine being with the disciples, all together in one room. Jesus has left you and you just don't know what is going on. Suddenly the whole house is filled with the noise of a powerful wind. Can you hear it? Something that looks like

tongues of fire appears and settles on each person's head. Can you see them? Now you are filled with the Holy Spirit and great confidence. Nothing can stop you all rushing outside and telling everyone you know all about Jesus!



LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. The disciples are given power through the gift of the Holy Spirit.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM PSALM 103

Send forth your Spirit, O Lord, and renew the face of the earth.
Or Alleluia!



The cantor or psalmist sings or says the psalm. Listen to the verses, and then respond by using these words.



SECOND READING 1 GALATIANS 5:16-25

Sometimes we are tempted to be selfish and do things we know are wrong. But we don't need to worry. God loves us and has sent the Holy Spirit to help us. The Holy Spirit will help us to be full of love, joy, peace, patience,

kindness, goodness, trustfulness, gentleness and self-control. These gifts will not appear by magic, we have to practise using them. The more we practise, the more we will become like Jesus. Let the Holy Spirit guide us!



LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. The gifts of the Holy Spirit will help us to lead good lives.



GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia!
Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love.
Alleluia!

DO YOU KNOW?

We all receive the gift of the Holy Spirit when we are baptised. In confirmation we receive the "special strength of the Holy Spirit" (CCC). There are different gifts of the Spirit. You might like to find out what they are and practise using them so that people will see the fruits of the Spirit in your life.



THINK

It's frustrating when we don't understand what Jesus is saying, but it's good to remember that even the disciples didn't understand at first. Bit by bit everything became clearer to them, but it was a long journey. The great thing is, like the disciples, we all have the Holy Spirit to help along the way!



GOSPEL JOHN 15:26-27; 16:12-15

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St John.

Jesus tries to explain the Holy Spirit to his friends. Jesus, God the Son, will send them God the Holy Spirit when he goes back to God the Father. Although the disciples have been with Jesus from the start, they still don't really understand all that Jesus has shared with them.

The Holy Spirit is going to help them to grow in their understanding and lead them to the truth. The Holy Spirit will help us too, as we grow in our relationship with God and understand more about Jesus' love – and will help us to share this message with everyone we meet.


